## Our School

### Description

Britton-Macon Area School is a product of the 1951 consolidation of ten rural districts with the Britton School – Barrett, Clark, Easlick, Getty, Kniffen, Merritt, Prairie, Rankin, and Sutton. The building offers a comprehensive K-12 educational program.

The Britton-Macon Area School is located along M-50 approximately eight miles West of Dundee and six miles East of Tecumseh. There is easy access from US-23.

## Overview of Our School

### Accreditation

The community of Britton-Macon Area School has selected the School Improvement model from North Central Accreditation. Britton-Macon received accreditation in 2000-01 and has continued to meet the high standards set by the NCA. North Central Accreditation is voluntary and entails an extensive self-study, visitations, and verification from educators throughout the State of Michigan. NCA accreditation maintains the highest accreditation standards that schools can achieve.

Education YES! is a state assessment that provides Michigan public schools with a grade.

### Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) Data

Adequate Yearly Progress is the federal measure under the No Child Left Behind Act, used to hold schools and districts responsible for students achievement in English, Language Arts, and Math.

Michigan administered grade level tests for English Language Arts and Mathematics in 2008-2009, in response to NCLB guidelines. Separate targets for proficiency were identified for each grade. Our school's AYP was calculated based upon a weighted average of our scores that considers the number of our students tested at each grade level.

**School Improvement Initiatives**

A professional learning committee called North Central Accreditation/ED YES Steering Committee was organized consisting of teachers, students, parents, administrators and Lenawee Intermediate School District support staff. This school improvement committee analyzed school district Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) and Michigan Merit Exam (MME/ACT) state assessment data. District academic strengths and weaknesses were identified at each K-12 grade levels. Teachers were divided into four core subject sub-committees (English Language Arts, Science, Social Studies and Math). Each sub-committee collaboratively engaged in continuous improvement by implementing goals and strategies to help improve student performances. These school improvement committees embraced the North Central (NCA) process of research, professional services and began the five year accreditation process.

## Dual Enrollment and Advanced Studies

During the 2008-09 school year, 11 of 100 juniors and seniors attended college classes in the afternoons. In the 2007-08 school year, 29 out of 94 juniors and seniors were dual enrolled.

During graduation exercises in 2008, 8 out of 51 graduates received Advanced Studies Diplomas. During graduation exercises in 2007, 7 out of 48 graduates received their Advanced Studies Diplomas.

## Core Curriculum

BMAS follows the county curriculum, which follows the state benchmarks in each core curricular area. Staff meets periodically, usually during Common Planning Time mornings, to discuss and align the curriculum to meet these benchmarks and student needs. All students are required to take core academic classes before being allowed to enroll in electives in each academic area.

## Parent Participation

One of the most important factors in a child's educational success is the involvement of parents or guardians. It is important for parents, teachers, and students to discuss the student's progress on a regular basis. We welcome and encourage parent participation in the educational process. ## Specialized School

The students of Britton-Macon Area School receive Special Education Services through the Lenawee Intermediate School District. In addition to the specialized schools, students receive diagnostic testing, school psychology, school social work, physical and occupational therapy, vocational-technical special needs training and speech pathology services.

The Lenawee Intermediate School District provides educational services to students from birth to age 25 who have severe handicaps. Students with severe physical, mental, emotional or sensory impairments may receive their educational program at a classroom operated by the LISD. No students from Britton-Macon Area School attended LISD classroom programs during the 2008-09 school year. The LISD operates the Laura Haviland Program for elementary, middle and high school students with severe emotional and behavioral impairments. There were no students from Britton-Macon Area School that attended Laura Haviland during the 2008-09 school year.

In cooperation with the Lenawee County Probate Court, the LISD operates the juvenile education program housed at the Maurice Spear Campus. There were no BMAS students placed at the Maurice Spear Campus during the 2008-09 school year.

The LISD operates special education classrooms in local districts including classrooms for students with cognitive impairments and hearing impairments in Madison; classrooms for students with other health impairments in Tecumseh; and classrooms for students with cognitive impairments in Adrian. Two students from Britton-Macon Area School attended these programs during the 2008-09 school year.

The Lenawee People Reaching Educational Potential Program (PREP) provides educational programs for teen parents from Lenawee County. During the student's instructional program, childcare support is provided. No students from Britton-Macon Area School attended the PREP program during the 2008-09 school year.

The Lenawee Vocational Technical Center offers career-focused programs for high school juniors and seniors. Forty-seven students from Britton-Macon Area School attended the Vo-Tech Center or participated in the co-op/work experience program during 2008-09. This equals 51.6% of the junior/senior population for this school district.

The most recent follow-up of LISD Vo-Tech Center students (a 2008 study of 2007 graduates) showed 58.7% were continuing their education. Of those continuing their education, 65.4% were continuing in a field related to their LISD Vo-Tech Center program. In addition, 70.5% were working (full-time or part-time) with one reporting they were seeking employment. Of those working full-time, 43.9% were in a field related to their LISD Vo-Tech Center Program.

Local districts operate special education classrooms open to students from other districts. Clinton Community Schools placed one student, Blissfield Community Schools placed five students, Clinton Community Schools placed three students and Onsted Community Schools placed four students with Britton-Macon Area School during the 2008-09 school year.

## National Junior Honor Society

The National Junior Honor Society is one of the leading organizations for recognizing and involving outstanding middle school students across the nation.

The purpose of the National Junior Honor Society is to create enthusiasm for scholarship, to stimulate a desire to serve, to promote leadership, to develop character, and to encourage citizenship in middle school students.

The Britton chapter of NJHS invites all 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> graders who have attained a 3.25 GPA to submit information for possible membership. Students are interviewed and evaluated by a faculty council and recommended for induction.

Members are encouraged to set high standards for themselves, both in and out of the classroom. Serving as role models, emphasis is on respect and responsibility. All members are expected to participate in service projects, to see a need in the school or community, and to plan, execute, and evaluate a project to meet that need.

During the 2008 – 2009 school year, the NJHS chapter in Britton reached a membership of 24. Thirteen were returning eighth graders, five were new eighth graders, and six were new seventh graders. Members conducted a formal induction ceremony in early November.

Breakfast meetings were held once a month during second hour. Service needs were discussed, as well as project planning and opportunities to participate. Time was given to celebrate our individual and group successes. We allowed ourselves a Secret Santa holiday party.

In addition to personal projects, our membership successfully sponsored the following service and fundraising projects.

## **Britton-Macon DECA Chapter**

The Britton-Macon DECA Chapter grew to 48 members last year, winning State recognition for chapter growth and 100% membership. In January of 2009, chapter members traveled to Eastern Michigan University to compete in District competition. Each member competed by taking an online occupational 100 question exam and participated in a role play event in front of judges from various businesses/industries. ## **National Honor Society**
